Admissions

Nursery

We offer places in our nursery to children after their 3rd birthday. The admissions process is run through the school office and we have a waiting list for pupils who are not yet 3. We follow the Leeds City Council school holidays but choose our own training days. We inform parents of the new school calendar each year as soon as we can so you can use this to make plans.

Uniform

Our school uniform colour is a combination of red and grey/black. Most items can be bought from High Street shops.

- Jumpers / cardigans red. These can be plain or have the school logo embroidered on which can be ordered from My Clothing.
- Polo shirts—red or white.
- ❖ Trousers / skirts / shorts—plain black or grey. (shorts must be smart and tailored and of a suitable length- no lyrca sports shorts or leggings).
- Shoes/sandals—plain black or white, pumps are fine.
- Summer Dresses—red and white check.



All school uniform MUST be named.

Shoes should be flat and appropriate for school. If trainers are worn these should be plain (and preferably black) and without logos. Your child should wear shoes which they can manage to do up independently. Please do not send your child to school in shoes which prevent them from running in the playground. If boots are worn these also should be plain and with a flat heel. Nursery children do not need to wear uniform but please make sure they wear clothes that you don't mind them getting messy! Jewellery for school should only be a small pair of stud earrings. Children should not wear make up or false nails for school.

P.E and Games Kit

Children need a change of clothes and footwear for P.E and a bag in which to keep the kit at school. Kits should be brought to school on a Monday and taken home on a Friday to be washed.

- Plain tracksuit
- Plain white t shirt
- Outdoor trainers
- Plain shorts (Summer term)

For health and safety reasons children are not permitted to wear any jewellery, including earrings, for P.E. Your child's teacher will advise you when P.E lessons take place so that earrings can be removed or taped over. Tape or plasters should be provided from home.

The School Day

We will open the gates at 08:30, the classroom doors will open at 08:40 and will close at 08:50.

Home time is 15:15 for all classes.

Before and After School Care

We have Breakfast and After School Club which provides before and after school care from 7.15am until 5.30pm. Please see the information on our school website for further information.

Lunchtimes

School Dinners

School dinners are provided free of charge to pupils in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2.

School dinners are cooked to order every day in school. There are menus on the school website and around the school building so that pupils can decide what they would like to eat each day.

There are usually three choices of food to choose from. This includes a hot dish and a choice of sandwiches.

Each child makes their choice during registration. This system ensures that the kitchen does not run out of one dish, meaning that every child gets their first choice meal.

Pupils in years 3-6 need to pay £2.40 per day for a school. This is paid online through school money. The link to this is on the school website but you will need to speak to the school office to register. If you don't have online access then you will be given a barcode which will enable you to pay at any PayPoint.

Free School Meals

If you think you may be entitled to free school meals then please speak to the office. There is information about this on the school website, however the application has to be made through Leeds City Council.

Packed lunch

Pupils have the option of eating a packed lunch. Please ensure that any packed lunch is healthy and nutritious to help your child to be able to remain focused for the remainder of the school day. Please note – we are a nut free school due to allergies so please do not send any food containing nuts as this could be very dangerous for those who are allergic.

Milk

If you would like your child to have milk at school, please contact the school office and let them know. There is a charge for this if you are not entitled to free school meals.

Cashless School

Please note we are a cashless school and therefore do not accept any form of payment in the school office. Any request for payment from the school must be paid via School Money.

Once your child has started at Armley Park Primary, the administration team will email and text you a link to the website (www.eduspot.co.uk) along with your password.

If you do not have internet access, you can request a barcode from the school office so that you can make payments at any PayPoint.

If you have any problems then please contact the school office.

Absence and Attendance

School starts at 8:40 and finishes at 3:15 for all children. We expect children to arrive on time so they are able to access all of the learning for the day.

Regular attendance and punctuality is vital if your child is to make good progress and build strong friendships.

Please ensure that your child arrives promptly each day. If they arrive once the cloakroom doors are closed, they will need to go through the school office and sign in using the electronic system. This helps us to make sure our registers are correct.

If your child is absent from school then please inform us as soon as possible. The school phone line opens at 8.00am. If we have not been contacted by 9.30am we shall contact you to ascertain the reason for your child's absence. We ask that you contact school on every day of your child's absence.

We monitor attendance and punctuality across the school at the end of each half term. Parents will be informed by letter if a child's attendance is below 95% or if punctuality is a concern.

Holidays

If you need to take your child out of school during term time please complete an exceptional circumstances request form – these are available at the school office or on the school website.

As of 1st September 2013, Headteachers are no longer able to grant any leave of absence for family holidays unless there are 'exceptional circumstances' which support the request being made.


Other than under very exceptional circumstances they will be classed as unauthorised absence. The school has a duty to report 5 days of unauthorised absence in a 12 week period for pupils of school age to Leeds City Council. The Local Authority may then issue a Penalty Notice (to each parent).

Behaviour and Our School Values

The school sets high standards and has high expectations of behaviour. These expectations are continually reinforced by teachers and other staff in all areas of the school throughout the school day and good behaviour is praised and rewarded. Children are involved at the beginning of every year in writing a class mission statement, setting class targets and working together on behaviour in the classroom and around the school.

A strong home/school/child relationship is very valuable. We also seek the help and cooperation of parents and carers. We feel that open, friendly communication with parents enables us to give each other the valuable mutual support which will allow your child to thrive at our school, no matter what challenges they face.

As a school we use a range of positive strategies to promote good behaviour which are linked to the class rules or school values. Praise is used by all staff to reward good behaviour.



- Each child has their own jigsaw board and they aim to collect Pink Slips which recognise they
 have shown one of our school values. Once they have five Pink Slips for the same value,
 they receive that piece of the jigsaw. By the end of the year, we hope that children will
 complete their jigsaw.
- Dojos are awarded to all pupils for exceptional effort. These are collected online and those
 with high numbers in each class are rewarded by the teacher.
- Each class has a Recognition Board where children who make the right choices towards a short-term goal are acknowledged.
- Stars of the Week awards are chosen once a week by class teachers to reward great effort shown by pupils with their learning and behaviour. These awards are presented during Friday assembly.

A traffic lights behaviour system is applied across the school. Pupils start each session on green and receive a warning before moving up the traffic light if they display unacceptable behaviour. There are clear expectations for each class which they are reminded of at the start of each day. If a child reaches red then they will receive a sanction.

Safeguarding

At Armley Park Primary School, we are committed to safeguarding and promoting the well-being of children and young people. Our school expects all staff and volunteers to share this commitment. The outcomes of this are that children and young people at Armley Park Primary School feel happy and safe. We therefore aim to provide a caring, safe environment in this school alongside a curriculum in which children's self-esteem and independence are nurtured, and they develop an understanding of how to keep themselves safe in the community and online.

Special Educational Needs

A child has special educational needs if they have a learning difficulty that calls for special educational provision which is different from or additional to that normally available to pupils of the same age. Our school SENCo (Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator) is Mrs Howard and she can be contacted through the office if you would like to discuss any matters with her.

Fundamental Principles

A child has a learning difficulty or disability if he or she:

- Has a significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of others of the same age
- Has a disability which prevents or hinders him or her from making use of educational facilities
 of a kind generally provided for others the same age

There are 4 areas of need:

Communication and interaction	Social, emotional and mental health difficulties
Cognition and learning, including specific learning difficulties	Sensory and/ or physical needs

As a school:

We pride ourselves on being a fully inclusive school, tailoring learning to individual needs.

We promote high standards for our special educational needs pupils

We make sure our special educational needs children have full access to an inspiring curriculum

The views of the child are always sought and integral to our monitoring and review cycles

Parents views are central and working in collaboration is at the heart of our special educational needs provision

We work closely with other agencies, including statutory bodies to meet the needs of pupils.

Parental Engagement

Our school welcomes input from parents as we firmly believe that parents and teachers working together, offering mutual support, can help the children to be happy and successful at school.

Alongside informal opportunities to meet the staff, we have a parents' evening in the Autumn term and the Spring term and at the end of the Summer term you will receive a written school report about your child.

If you would like to speak to your child's class teacher at any time during the year then you can ring the school office to ask for a phone call or arrange a meeting.

Each term parents receive information about the kind of work, projects and themes that are being studied in your child's year group. You will also receive knowledge organisers for some subjects that will give an overview of what your child will be learning in the topic. Your interest, support and encouragement can make huge difference in how well your child does at school.

We hope to be able to offer lots of opportunities for parents to come into school to celebrate the learning and achievements of our pupils as soon as it is safe to do so.

Homework

The most important thing that you can do with your child to help them with their learning is regular reading. We aim for children at Armley Park Primary School to read at home at least three times per week with an adult, although of course, many read more than this.

Children in all years will also be required by their teacher to do some other homework. Pupils may be asked to read their book, learn new phonics sounds and words, their number bonds, times tables and spelling lists or be asked to complete some homework on an element of maths they have been working on. Some homework will be related to finding out about the topic the children are studying at the time. Some children may be given personalised homework designed specifically to help and support them with their learning. Parents are asked to support and encourage the children with this work.

Medication

It is important that your child's teacher is aware of any particular health problems that your child may have. This includes any allergies or intolerances to certain food types/groups. If your child becomes ill at school we will make every effort to contact you, but we will act as substitute parents until you arrive, even if the illness/injury requires that we take your child to hospital. It is vital that your contact numbers are kept up to date in the school office for this reason. Where possible we would prefer it if children could be given their medicine at home, however, staff can administer prescribed medicines if a medicine in school form (available at the school office or on the school website) is completed by the parent/carer. We welcome parents into school to give their children medication.
